Funeral services were held yesterday for Dr. Bradford Turley, a respected member of Oakville's medical and social community.

Turley died at his own home on Sunday following a battle with cancer. He was 51.

Turley, who ran his family practice in Oakville for over 20 years, will be remembered fondly by both colleagues and patients for his efficient work, genuine attitude and friendly smile.

"I have never met a person who was as consistently upbeat as Brad," said Dr. Sol Stern, whom Turley occasionally assisted in the operating room. "The positive attitude and tremendous

skill with which Brad worked made him an admired member of the hospital staff."

"Brad was a very special guy," said Dr. David Posen, a colleague of Turley's at OTMH. "He was a bright light in the medical community, someone that you could look to set a positive example in any situation."

Dr. Tim Deakin, a knee specialist at OTMH, said Turley would often develop personal friendships with his patients.

"Brad would always go that extra mile for his patients," said Deakin. "I can't count the number of times Brad came to me with details about his patients that I needed to know before I saw them. He didn't have a clipboard, either. He just remembered the details because they weren't only his patients, they were his friends."

Turley was not only a devoted father to his two children, but found time for others as well.

"He attended all of his children's events such as graduations, he was so proud of them," said friend and colleague Dr. Ken Collett. "He also took the time to help teach my kids how to

"One night, he had the opportunity to go out to dinner with a bunch of the guys who had gone to Montreal for the tournament, but instead asked my wife and I if he could join us for a quiet dinner. 
